Date Festivals in March

March 12 <u>St. Patrick's Day Parade</u> begins 11:30 a.m. at 2nd Street and Market Street, San Francisco. It ends at the Civic Center in a festival with entertainment, arts and crafts, Irish exhibitors, food, and kids' rides until 5 p.m. Free.

Celebrate St. Patrick's Day with kids' activities and a <u>Flying Leprechaun</u> who leaps from a helicopter at 11 a.m. and parachutes down to give each child wearing green a toy at Hiller Aviation Museum in San Carlos.

- March 12 <u>City of Dublin St. Patrick's Day Celebration</u> includes a free two-day festival at Dublin Civic Center 13 with food, music, dance, and vendors, plus a Saturday parade at 9:30 a.m., and a Sunday Shamrock 5K run/walk.
- March 12 Celebrate St. Patrick's Day on both the parade day (March 12) and St. Patrick's & 17 Day (March 17) at <u>St. Patrick's Day Block Party</u> at the Irish Bank Bar in San Francisco with live music and beer.
- March 18 California's Artisan Cheese Festival Attend seminars and tastings led by cheese experts, cheese makers, chefs, and fromagiers during at the Sheraton Sonoma in Petaluma.
- March 18 <u>Silicon Valley Comic Con</u> is a new convention that combines pop-culture and technology, featuring comics, video games, celebrities, cosplay, music, and entertainment at San Jose Convention Center.
- March 19 Enjoy finger foods and local vendors while your dog sniffs out eggs filled with tasty treats and prizes at the <u>Easter Egg Hunt for Dogs</u> in Old Speedway Meadow at Golden Gate Park, San Francisco. Costumes welcome.
- March 19 <u>Goodguys All American Get-Together</u> See 3,000 American hot rods, customs, 20 muscle cars, classics, and trucks at the Alameda County Fairgrounds in Pleasanton.
- March 26 <u>Big Bunny 5K</u> has medals by age category; the Kid's Fun Run has medals for all at Cupertino Civic Center.

Eggstravaganza is a family-friendly event with egg hunts, carnival rides, games, live entertainment, kids activities, and a BBQ competition at Sharon Meadow in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco. Children 2 and under are free.








Competition Winners Tell Us How They Did It


Between the Rocks Rick Whitacre

This picture started as the image of a freeway bridge in San Francisco shown here. This picture was taken on a foggy day which helped control the brightness and shadows.

The picture was tuned in Lightroom and moved to Photoshop for the creative modification. This effect was achieved with a built-in Photoshop filter, distort/wave. I generally don't use filters as the main effect in creative images, but this creates a unique look that would be difficult to achieve any other way. I just played around with the filter controls until I got something that I liked.

Many of my images are grab shots taken on-the-fly as I see them. This image was taken on a cold December day while photographing the SJ Holiday Parade in downtown San Jose. I had wandered out into the middle of Santa Clara street to catch an approaching band in the parade. After capturing what I wanted, I turned to see this strange pattern of traffic lines. I grabbed another shot and returned to the sidewalk. Later while sorting my photos this shot immediately went into the Creative folder

Nikon D300 with minor cropping.

The lesson here is if you see something you like - take a photo - even if you need to walk into the middle of traffic.

White Orchid Petal Origami Mary Ellen Kaschub

I had become interested in what I call "faded beauty." I was noticing flowers, leaves and other natural living things that were past their prime but a different kind of beauty remained. I think it's easy to admire flowers when they are new and fresh - but there is also beauty in their "less-than-perfect" versions. On that note, I was admiring some white orchid petals that had dropped onto the table. They were neat looking and photographed them on a black background.

Once that was done, I thought I wonder if I can play with them in PS - I did using different arrangements and of course getting different results. This particular image I especially liked as it reminded me of origami and maybe a moth. It was done with a "mirror" montage overlay, an alignment of shapes that appeared and then brightened to bring back to white and keep some of the petal transparency! It was all play and fun driven by curiosity!

February 2015 First Place Monochrome Print

This is a portrait of my Labrador retriever, Luke.

I purchased a large piece of black velvet material from a fabric store. I draped it over the couch. I had a westerly window with good light. Luke was a good model and was happy to pose as long as he got lots of attention. I set up my camera on a tripod about six feet from my model and took several photos. I observed that I had a well-balanced histogram.

Since Luke and the background were black, I should have had a histogram that was concentrated to the left (a low key image). The result was that the image was underexposed. This was corrected with the exposure slider in Lightroom. The highlights and shadows sliders were used to adjust brightness of the background and Luke's fur. I experimented with the sliders until I was satisfied with the results. I spent a lot of time removing dust and dandruff spots from the image.

The first time I entered the image the judge said that the nose was too prominent and should have had the sharpening reduced. He also thought there were still too many dust and dandruff spots. I made the changes suggested by the first judge, re-entered the image and won first place.

This photograph was taken on a NatureScapes "Ultimate Iceland Arctic Adventure " Photography Workshop, May 27 - June 9, 2015, led by E.J. Peiker and Johann Oli Hilmarsson. The GPS coordinates of the site of the photograph are 64°55'34" N 23°18'39" W.

The equipment used was a tripod supported Nikon D800E with a Nikon 24-70mm f/2.8 lens at 24mm. A 4-stop ND filter was used to allow a slow shutter speed to blur the water. A polarizing filter was also used. The exposure conditions were 0.5 sec, f/11 and ISO 100. The image was processed in Lightroom and printed on Epson Hot Press Bright paper.

First, of all, I would like to note that my title was a tribute to David Bowie who was in a film titled The Man Who Fell to Earth. I was walking into Vasona, a place I walk into almost daily. The time was last November when one of our first storms was approaching. The skies were moody, portending almost immediate rain. I went in with my friend, Howard, who lives in New York state to see the birds. Often before a storm or just afterwards the birds go crazy in Vasona. This was no exception. Blue Herons, Egrets, Night Herons, Green Herons, Snowies were all dipping and diving. Beautiful.

We walked from one side of the lake to the other to take more photos of birds. Under a sloping hillside, a Gingko had dropped its golden yellow leaves in mass beneath its now bare branches. The light further illuminated this blanket of yellow. Howard dropped down and called, "Take my picture."

I walked around him, taking as many angles as I could, from up high to as low as I could crouch. When I loaded the different photo angles on my computer, I landed on the one I submitted. I, however, rotated the photo 180 degrees which contributed to the rather different perspective. My ISO was 800. My f stop was 8. I did a little enhancing of light in Photo Elements.




Man Who Fell to Earth on Yellow Leaves Susan Anawalt

Nature Competition Definition

Nature images are restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict observations from all branches of natural history except anthropology and archeology in such a fashion that a well-informed person will be able to identify the subject matter and certify as to its honest presentation. The story-telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality.

Human elements shall not be present, except on the rare occasion where those human elements enhance the nature story. The presence of scientific bands on wild animals is acceptable. Photographs of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements, are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation, manual or digital, that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

No elements may be moved, cloned, added, deleted, rearranged, or combined. No manipulation or modification is permitted except resizing, cropping, selective lightening or darkening, and restoration of original color of the scene. No special effect filters can be applied. Any sharpening must appear natural. Borders are not permitted. The title should be factual and descriptive and will be read as shown. Scientific names are encouraged but are not to be used as a basis for judging.
