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Reminders

Nature Competition Definition

Nature images are restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict observations from all branches of natural history except anthropology and archeology in such a fashion that a well-informed person will be able to identify the subject matter and certify as to its honest presentation. The story-telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality.

Human elements shall not be present, except on the rare occasion where those human elements enhance the nature story. The presence of scientific bands on wild animals is acceptable. Photographs of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements, are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation, manual or digital, that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

No elements may be moved, cloned, added, deleted, rearranged, or combined. No manipulation or modification is permitted except resizing, cropping, selective lightening or darkening, and restoration of original color of the scene. No special effect filters can be applied. Any sharpening must appear natural. Borders are not permitted.

The title should be factual and descriptive and will be read as shown. Scientific names are encouraged but are not to be used as a basis for judging.

Inside & Outside The Amargosa Opera House; Death Valley John Perry


The Amargosa Opera House was originally know as Corkhill Hall. It was part of company town designed by Alexander Hamilton McCulloch for the Pacific Coast Borax Company employees in Death Valley Junction. In 1967 a singer, dancer, actress and painter named Marta Becket came to Death Valley Junction and rented Corkhill Hall. Her vision was to turn the hall into an opera house where she could perform for the local residents. She changed the name to Amargosa Opera House and began renovation of the inside. Marta hand painted all the murals on the adobe walls.

I had the good fortune to be in Death Valley Junction when the opera house was open for tours. I spent several hours taking photographs of the murals on the walls that resemble a French court. I got the idea for a montage because it allowed showing off the uniqueness of the inside and outside of this amazing architectural wonder. Marta Becket performed a one woman show in the opera house from 1970 until 2012. She truly was an amazing woman.


Using Photoshop Elements, I carefully selected the GATC lettering from the original figure and merged it with the double helix (and adjusted the opacity).


This was one of those lucky shots. It was lucky because I had my camera and the perspective and light were perfect for me to see the unusual lines in a very normal sidewalk scene.
